



Rev.Elations

Things have gotten off to a rough start in the upper Midwest this summer. Inundated towns, flooded roads and four-dollar-a-gallon gas are putting a real crimp in many people's plans. In last month's newsletter column I tried to put a positive spin on spending time closer to home. I didn't realize at the time that for many folks this might be a matter of real necessity rather than of choice.

Trina and I took our "summer trip" to see our son in Minneapolis over Father's Day weekend. Sunday afternoon we visited the Sculpture Gardens and saw a fascinating special display of suburban-related art at the Walker Museum. (Did you know that 20% of existing suburban malls in America are either vacant or failing, or that nationwide more minorities now live in suburbs than in central cities?) Travel to and fro was a bit of a challenge with all the road closures around Madison but, come what may, we had resolved to remain unflustered and upbeat for the sake of an adult child we were both anxious to see.

Apart from our brief encounters with the Minneapolis art scene and some great conversation with Kyle, one other aspect of this trip proved illuminating.

Heading north on U.S. 14 and the Great River Road we reached the Twin Cities without serious incident or delay. Returning the following

afternoon we took a chance on the Interstate. To my surprise, cruising along in our Toyota Prius we felt a lot like the proverbial turtle contending with a field of hares. I drove at precisely the posted speed limit of 65 MPH and overtook not a single vehicle between Hudson and Wisconsin Dells. Virtually every other driver was traveling faster than us (and this is the surprising part) despite the dramatic impact high speeds have on fuel economy.

Obviously, this reflects a significant disconnect between consumers' complaints about the cost of gas on the one hand, and their customary driving habits on the other. The plain truth is, people can realize significant savings simply by slowing down yet so far relatively few have made that connection. Predictably, Americans have been clamoring for a political solution to a problem for which they refuse to assume much

personal responsibility.

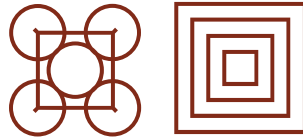
Think about it: with a tad more patience on our part, desecration of the Arctic Wilderness and some of the world's most fragile marine ecosystems might be averted, our nation's security enhanced and our own bank accounts bumped up a bit. We've been in a hurry for too long. It's time we learned what the tortoise knew all along: that slow and sure wins the race.

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Central Midwest District “Chalice Lighter” Grant to James Reeb!

James Reeb Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Madison, our sister congregation on the east side of Madison, has been awarded the current Chalice Lighter grant by the Central Midwest District of the UUA.

Chalice Lighters was founded in the 1980s to harness the energy and resources of Unitarian Universalists across the district to support congregational growth. In September, December and March, calls are issued to fund new congregation starts, add professional staff, build new or enhanced space or accomplish outreach and public relations programs. Chalice Lighter members, individual UUs around the district who have pledged to respond to the calls, each contribute \$10 or more, no more than three times a year. The funds raised serve to give congregations the financial boost they need - grants often run over \$10,000 - to take on goals which otherwise are financially out-of-reach.

Since inception, the program has supported over 33 congregations and issued grants totaling \$217,737, including two Chalice Lighter grants to FUS.

James Reeb plans to use its grant to expand the scope and hours of their Director of Religious Education. In the past five years the number of children in religious education at James Reeb has doubled from 40 to 80 – a transformation which is both a challenge and opportunity. They know through pledge notes, written surveys and formal conversations that Religious Education is one of the primary programs that brings new members into their congregation.

Results of the 2008 Canvass

Each year, prior to the annual pledge drive, the pledge committee canvasses (personally visits) about one-fifth of the congregation or 200 households. This is an opportunity for members make suggestions, ask questions and comment on their experience at FUS. This year the canvassers were instructed to ask three questions of persons who were canvassed:

1. What would your ideal FUS look like?
2. What things would you change or improve at FUS?
3. In what ways has FUS met or exceeded your expectations?

While the responses are not necessarily representative of the congregation, the committee felt it was important to share the responses with the rest of the congregation and the staff at First Unitarian Society. Here are some:

Positive Responses

- Many people were very pleased with the quality of the worship services.
- The music program for both children and adults received high marks.
- People were also pleased with the Religious Education programs offered to adults and children.
- Some people who are not currently active at FUS due to family or work issues look forward to being active again in the future. In the meantime they expressed gratitude for a single program that helped them stay connected – the electronic newsletter, sermon podcasts, chalice groups, and men's group were mentioned.

Concerns

Concerns were more difficult to categorize. With a few exceptions, they did not focus on any one area.

- Parking continues to be a concern.
- Some people found the construction of the new building to be challenging. A related concern was too much focus on money.
- A few people mentioned a desire for a more diverse congregation.

- The largest concern was absence of a sense of community. While many felt FUS provided many opportunities to get involved with smaller groups, others find it hard to feel connected with a sense of belonging. Several members also expressed a concern about how the new building will affect the sense of community at FUS. Some felt the new building will enhance community by providing more space for socialization after services and more room to include children during services. Others felt that if we continue to grow, it will be even harder to get or stay connected at FUS.

The feedback provided through the annual canvas will inform the work of lay leaders and staff as we move into the home stretch of our facility expansion project, and as we can begin to turn our full attention back to our beloved FUS community, living our values in the community at large.

All councils work to support a sense of belonging in our beloved community. Hardhat Update

Report from the project

It's sunny and bright, the building is water tight, and there is so much activity that it is hard to walk through without getting in someone's way.

Although we're high and dry on our sandy knoll, the flooding did affect our project. We managed to send off one trailer last Thursday between monsoons, but the Wisconsin DOT cancelled all wide load permits south of Highway 29 for the subsequent week. So the trailers stayed until the floods out-state subsided and the roads were clear. They finally left us the following Thursday. Dan Broner and I remain in the last trailer that looked so huge at first, but now seems tiny and forlorn.

Sidewalk Superintending

By the end of the week, the roofers will be done with all the exterior trim. Because the trim on the south wall is metal, it is being applied by the roofers. When the south wall is done grading and then landscaping can proceed, starting at the C wing classrooms.

Inside

Auditorium: The wood trim is in place between the vertical beams and the maple slats and sound reflectors are up in the choir corner. Ceiling lights and microphones hung.

Classroom Hall: The walls are painted, baseboards and door frames are in place.

Parking

The Shorewood Hills Board approved our application to extend our parking lot toward University Bay Drive this week. This will add nine more parking spaces to the Meeting House lot.

Volunteers

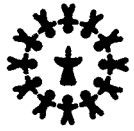

Couches Needed!

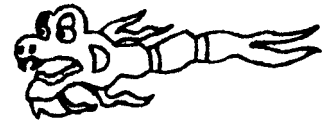

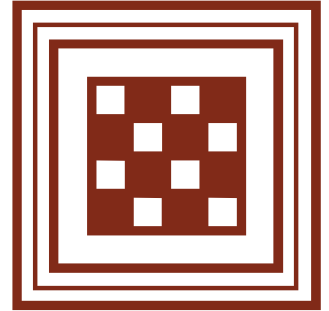
